From the Senior Minister

As many of you are probably aware, I announced my intention to retire as your senior minister in September of 2021. I began serving as a youth director when I was a college freshman and have been on a church staff since the fall of 1975. That will equate to 46 years on a church staff at the time of my retirement; 42 years' full time and 37 years since ordination. While much has changed over the years, my belief in the church as God's hands and feet has not changed. While I am well aware of the imperfections that churches have because they are comprised of imperfect people (like me) we gather to worship God and do God's work to the best of our ability. I have had a ring side seat to witness the transformational power of the local church, when we get things right...which we do, quite often.

The retirement conversation began with key leaders in 2017, when I informed them that my intention was to retire after Easter, 2020. After a series of conversations with church leaders in 2018, three different scenarios were presented to the Board of Trustees at their meeting in December 2018. The scenario approved by the board extended my retirement date to September 2021. As part of that scenario I was granted the opportunity to take a sabbatical leave for a few months this spring, which was a part of my original agreement, that a sabbatical would be considered after 7 years of service. I was also extended additional vacation time.

It often takes 18 months to 2 years or longer to secure a senior minister, so this scenario provides the church with time for a thorough search process; conducting a self-study and to identify the core competencies needed for the next senior leader, and to conduct a search. For a non-denominational mainline congregation such as ours, this process is often more challenging as we lack the pool of candidates that denominations are often able to provide. In this time where many congregations are struggling, especially mainline congregations, I feel we are in a good place and that the future of this 208-year-old congregation is bright. Over the past decade, we have grown younger, more diverse and we see many more people involved in hands-on ministry. We have completed over two million dollars in capital projects, upgrading our facilities and added over one million dollars to our endowment fund which allows us to expand our ministry in the community.

In the past two fiscal years, our general fund income has been at its highest level since 2001. In addition to all of this, I believe we have an excellent staff that is very gifted and committed to helping us live out our mission; **Connecting** people to Christ, **Growing** people to Spiritual Maturity, and using our gifts **Serve** God, by serving others.

While there are a several things that I want to see us address as a congregation in the next two years, a smooth transition to the next senior leader is among the most important. On Thursday evening, October 10, there will be a congregational dinner followed by an informational session and time for questions and answers.

The Nominating Committee has been hard at work during the summer and will be presenting their recommendations to the Board for a 12-member Senior Minister Search Committee (as the Church Constitution requires) along with 6 alternates. The Nominating Committee has been very deliberate to assure that the committee is diverse in its make up, both in gender and age along with church experience and backgrounds.

As we move into this time of transition, I believe it is essential to trust in the process and the work of the committee. I encourage you to pray for them, that God's spirit might guide them in this process. My guess is that they will be seeking feedback for the congregation at an appropriate time. Again, I think it is important for all of us to trust the work of this committee and avoid pushing individual agendas.

I want to close with this. Even with the challenges that churches of all kinds are facing at this time of dramatic cultural change, I believe that this congregation has a unique ability to be a game changer for Christ in Central New York. It will require us to continue to be focused on mission, and creative in our approach. It will not be dependent on finding some "super pastor" who makes everything happen, but on using all of the gifts of everyone to be calt and light, to be game changers, for Central New York and beyond.

This past month, during Homecoming weekend, our Senior Minister Rev. Dr. Mark Sommers announced his intention to retire from the ministry in September 2021 – two years from now. The Board of Trustees and church staff had advance notice of this announcement and so you may have heard rumors that are now confirmed. We have been fortunate to have our Senior Minister for over ten years, and even more fortunate to have this advance notice. Two years can seem a long time, but not too long to find a new minister. We now have the opportunity to conduct our search without resorting to an interim pastor, and to plan for an orderly transition.

I would like to briefly explain the search process as it is laid out in our Bylaws. The first step will be the formation of a Ministerial Selection Committee of twelve church members. The Chair of Personnel, Jim Opgenorth, and myself are automatic members. The Nominating Committee will recommend the other ten members who, among other criteria, are to "reflect the broad diversity" of our church and be willing "to consider the key challenges in our current church life." Nominating has already been considering members for the Selection Committee and will present their recommendations to the Trustees for approval at our October 9th meeting.

We expect the Ministerial Selection Committee will start their work in November, most likely with a period of "self study" to determine our needs and develop the criteria for choosing our next Senior Minister. This will be followed by the search for candidates. Ultimately the Selection Committee will recommend a candidate to the Board who received a "super-majority" three-fourths vote of the committee. The Board in turn will vote on this candidate, and again a super-majority is required for approval. The final step will be a special congregational meeting where a three-fourths majority vote of members present is required for approval. If all goes well, we will be celebrating out transition to new leadership during Homecoming weekend 2021.

There is a great deal of work to be done, and we hope for your support during the entire process. There will be an opportunity for questions and answers at our Congregational Dinner on Thursday October 10th, and I encourage you all to attend.



Motivational Speaker, Humor Advantage, Inc

"How am I gonna make people laugh at the Rochester Club at noon?" Comedian and motivational speaker Yvonne Conte asked herself this exact question more than 17 years ago when she stumbled upon what she now understands to be her true calling, public speaking, "I never aspired to be a speaker," she said. "I never thought about being a speaker." Conte, now a Syracuse resident for many years, said her attitude changed when a miscommunication led to a speaking engagement in front of 150 area fund-raising executives representing several colleges and businesses.

She had less than two weeks to prepare for this impromptu presentation so she went to the local library and checked out every piece of material pertaining to humor, laughter and joy and how each aspect related to one another. Conte felt out of her comfort zone as she was primarily interested in doing standup comedy. She still laughs today because the "Rochester Club is not a place where you would do standup comedy." Nevertheless, she created a 20-minute presentation with a humble flipchart. "There were 150 people dressed in business suits, and [they were] real stiff," she said. "Tm thinking, this is going to be a disaster."

She added much of her comedy routine since it contains several family stories that turned into handy anecdotes for her presentation on laughter and joy and how it affects our minds and everyday life. "[At the end] they were on their feet and everyone wanted my business card! I said I forgot them, but of course, I didn't have any."

The next day, her career as a speaker began. After her success at the luncheon, Conte was highly recommended and booked for a speaking engagement that included five performances, airfare, hotel and all other accommodations. At this time, she was going to school full time at Monroe Community College and doing standup gigs at night. She arranged her appearances to be in December during her break from classes. After all arrangements and (generous) salary for the speaking engagements were settled, Conte knew this was no fluke. "I hought this is no accident, this is what God wanted me to do. I seem to be good at it."

Another memorable speaking engagement out of the gate was when she spoke in front of numerous professors at Keuka College. "Here I am, barely a high school graduate, never had any education just started school myself and I'm standing in front of these people who have a long line of letters after their names and great education and they give me a standing ovation." This appreciation from a large pool of professors taught her that all people need to hear about humor and understand how to relieve stress and enjoy their lives more.

Moments like this have brought Conte to even deeper understanding about her own life and how she views the people around her. "How can you change your life? By changing the way you look at life," she said. "I realized this was a very important subject, not just funny, and the business grew."

Conte has written six books about using humor as an advantage in everyone's lives and has had every inch of her business grow because of her client referrals. "This is the kind of business where nobody is going to hire you to speak unless they hear you speak or someone they really trust has heard you speak."

Giving Mental Health Awareness the Right Place in the Church

Recently my Facebook feed was full of expressions of grief, support, and lament over two very public deaths. Both people were active in bringing a focus on mental health issues. One was a professor of counseling, and the other was a well known West Coast Pastor Jarrid Wilson. Both died by suicide. These two people join the list of very pubic suicides of fashion designer Kate Spade, chef Anthony Bourdain, and comedian Robin Williams.

The above names and their stories are anecdotal evidence of statistics that are shocking. According to the Center of Disease Control and Prevention, in the United States alone in 2017, there were more than twice as many suicides (47,173) as there were homicides (19,510).¹ According to the National Institute of Health 9.8 million adults had serious thoughts of committing suicide, 2.8 million adults made suicide plans, and 1.3 million attempted suicide in 2017.² These are genuinely alarming numbers. The national suicide rate has increased by 33 percent between 1999 and 2017.³ This is a public health crisis.

Not only are adults affected but young people are experiencing the pain. Among 10 to 18-year-olds, suicide is the second leading cause of death in the United States.⁴ Jean M. Twenge, PhD, a professor of psychology at San Diego State University, wrote about the growing trend of anti-social behavior, teen suicide, depression, and changes in the emotional state of young people. Her research led her to publish the book: *iGen: Why Today's Super-Connected Kids Are Growing Up Less Rebellions, More Tolerant, Less Happy --and Completely Unprepared for Adulthood--and What That Means for the Rest of Us.* Dr. Twenge discovered that:

Psychologically... [the iGens, 8-17 year olds] are more vulnerable than Millennials were: Rates of teen depression and suicide have skyrocketed since 2011. It's not an exaggeration to describe iGen as being on the brink of the worst mental-health crisis in decades. Since 2007, the homicide rate among teens has declined, but the suicide rate has increased. As teens have started spending less time together, they have become less likely to kill one another, and more likely to kill themselves. In 2011, for the first time in 24 years, the teen suicide rate was higher than the teen homicide rate.⁵

Coupled with the rise of suicides, the opioid epidemic has gripped America's cities, suburbs, and rural areas. It seems that the research by Princeton University economists Anne Case and Angus Deaton is true: America's economy, with the atrophy of the middle class, has led to a rise in mental and physical anguish.⁶

As Christians, we must recognize that these trends, statistics, and facts have severe implications for our children, adults, and families. This is a moral problem that requires Christians to respond. In our culture and in our churches, there is a stigma attached to people who need to see a counselor, therapist, or psychiatrist.

I find that most people in church keep their mental health needs secret. They do not want to even share their struggles with close friends for fear of judgment. Men, especially, are reluctant to disclose their troubles because they do not want to be seen as "weak". Many Christians want to keep a face or appearance of "everything's great" but do not have the capacity or opportunity to say, "Help!"

Jesus was someone who was in constant connection to those in anguish, despair, and turmoil. For those who sought out Jesus, we read that they were looking for wholeness and good news. Some were outcasts, lepers, the "unclean" according to Jewish law, people suffering untreatable medical conditions, and the economically vulnerable. As Christians, we must not overlook the need to bring mental health at the forefront of our ministries to those in our church and our community.

As a church, we must seek respond with grace, compassion, and love to those who are struggling with difficult times. Here at DeWitt Community Church, we have a robust support system of pastors, Steven Ministers, small groups, Compassion Cooks, and ministries that seek to support people in their time of need.

In October, our preaching series "Healthy! Mind, Body, and Spirit" is aimed at bringing concerns of mental, physical, and spiritual health to the forefront. I hope you will join us each weekend to engage these topics. Also, we will hold a special workshop, "Mental Health First Aid Workshop" on October 18 & 19 (see page 1), that helps individuals respond to challenges related to caring and assisting loved ones, friends, and family through challenging times.



Chancel Choir

The Chancel Choir rehearses on Thursday nights at 7pm starting in September and helps to lead worship at the 11am Sunday service as well as a number of other times during the year. This group is made up of volunteers as well as four section leaders. There are NO requirements for joining the choir. You do not have to be able to read music. You do not have to be able to come to every rehearsal and every service, there is no attendance policy. Bell Choir

The Bell Choir rehearses on Thursday nights at 6pm starting in September and plays about eight times a year at the 11am worship service. Most importantly, you have to have a sense of humor.

Worship Team

We are hoping to enrich the worship at the 5:30 and 9am services with additional musicians - both vocalists and instrumentalists. This group would meet at mutually agreed upon times to rehearse music and create a schedule that meets the needs of those involved. Any musician at any level is welcome.

Worship Assistants

Worship assistants generally serve about once a month at one of our three services. They help to lead the congregation through the service and lead the time of prayer.
