To find hope in these times do these three things

We are looking for hope in these times. We see Coronavirus disruptions, economic upheaval, and racial inequality coming to a head in our cities. We may feel like we are like a boat without a rudder, and we are looking for that Guiding Force to help us.

As a pastor, I have learned there are three things to do in uncertain and disruptive times. The first two are this: look and listen.

These last weeks of ministry, we have seen very encouraging online engagement with our worship, prayer, devotionals, Bible study, and music. We reach thousands of individuals and families each week. I look online to how God is working in new ways. I look at how we are reaching new people because of our online social media ministry. I listen to how God is doing a new thing through disruption and change. I look and listen to how God is still working in ways seen and unseen, waiting for how God will work out God's purpose.

In uncertain times, to find hope, we look and listen.

John Claypool, a one-time Baptist turned Episcopalian author, professor, and pastor and, in his book, *The Hopeful Heart*, shares that in the 1960s while working towards healing of race relations in the South, a moment of hopelessness overcame him. While trying to bring together white and black pastors at a local synagogue, the meeting ended in failure with blame and anger. He turned to his rabbi friend and said,

"I think it is hopeless. This problem is so old, so deep, so many-faceted, there is simply no way out of it."

The rabbi, whose family had been through the holocaust knew the dark side of humanity, told Claypool:

"To the Jew, there is only one unforgivable sin, that is the sin of despair... humanly speaking, despair is presumptuous. It is saying something about the future that we have no right to say because we have not been there yet and do not know enough... We do not know enough to embrace the absolutism of despair... If God can

create the things that are from the things that are not, and even make dead things come back to life, who are we to set limits on what that kind of potency may yet do?"

The rabbi pointed John Claypool the truth of what the apostle Paul wrote in his second letter to the Corinthians 4:16-18:

"Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly, we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. 17 For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. 18 So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal."

Hope, as defined, by Saint Paul is this: the belief that God is not done working out God's purpose. God, who is unseen, is working in ways unknown to redeem failures, mistakes, and trauma. Hope is faith in that God is still at work. Where optimism is blind with regards to the future, hope sees God working in new and exciting ways. Hope is putting faith into that Holy Mystery that is God. Hope is to say, "God, this is awful. I need your help to redeem this mess. I do not know how or when, but I give myself and this mess to you."

In these times, we must look and listen AND act so that we may find the hope that God offers. Yes, the last thing to do in these uncertain times is to act. We must commit ourselves to action in how we will be the presence of Christ in our neighborhood and community. We cannot wait for someone else to be a healing presence. We must be the very hope to another that we are looking for in our world. We act compassionately, gracefully, and lovingly towards our friends, neighbors, and even enemies.

When we look, listen, and act, we can begin to find hope in uncertain times.

Another month of confinement has come and gone, and now we can begin to see light at the end of the tunnel. As I write these words we're on the cusp of Phase 2 of the State's restart plan. Mass gatherings, such as large church services, will be permitted in Phase 4, which will not happen any earlier than the end of June as long as Covid-19 cases remain low. Regardless of that timetable, DeWitt Community Church will resume live services once we feel it's safe to do so. We'll have a plan in place to protect us, and the congregation will receive at least two weeks advance notice.

Our May Trustees meeting assigned responsibility for drafting our restart plan, and passed a budget for the fiscal year starting in July. We also decided that for safety's sake the Annual Meeting, traditionally held in June, would be postponed to September 23. At the end of June I will be stepping down as your President; however I will continue to serve on the Senior Minister Selection Committee. After 9 years of continuous service as a Trustee my term has expired. Your Vice President Greg Stock will assume the duties of President in July. Greg has been my closest collaborator these past two years and has my full confidence. I encourage you to confirm him in this position at the Annual Meeting.

Since this will be my last newsletter article I'd like to share some reflections, and give thanks. During the past two years the overarching theme of my work has been to prepare the way for the next Sr. Minister. To that end I had three goals. First to complete negotiations for Rev. Dr. Mark Sommers retirement with the priceless gift of time for an adequate search. Second, to bring the size of our Board of Trustees into alignment with State law. Finally, placing our debt from past improvements into stable long term financing. A few loose ends remain on the financing, but all these goals have been reached.

As I lay aside the burdens of office there are many people I need to thank. First to the congregation I thank you for trusting me with the responsibilities of leadership. To Mark Sommers who persuaded me to take this job, I give thanks for our many mealtime meetings that made some hard truths easier to swallow. Thank you to our hardworking staff for everything they do for the church and our missions, and particularly Mick Thorpe who put up with me for the longest. I give thanks to Greg Stock and all the members of the Board of Trustees for their collective wisdom and civil debate. Whenever I've had moments of doubt I could lay problem out before them and together we reached well-reasoned solutions. Finally, I give thanks to my wife Linda, whose love and forbearance has seen me though these many years of service. Because of her my life is truly blessed



Transforming Experiences



An Update on Stewardship

Dear Members and Friends of DeWitt Community Church

These last weeks of ministry have been unprecedented as we continue to stop the spread of the Coronavirus by meeting as a church community virtually. We have seen very encouraging online engagement with our worship, prayer, devotionals, Bible study, and music. We reach thousands of individuals and families each week. Regarding reopening, we have formed a Reopening Team looking at timeline, practices, and safety protocols. Our annual meeting will be moved to September 23, 2020.

Despite the disruption of the pandemic, this has been a great program year at DeWitt Community Church with much to celebrate. We have 14 youth being confirmed in their faith this September, we have welcomed 13 new members, have a care ministry of 17 Stephen Ministers walking alongside people in need, have vital small groups and Bible studies, and we sent our first Ambassador Team to Africa to support Hope for Ariang. God is indeed working through our church!

There is one area of concern and we are asking our members and friends to help. With about one month left in our fiscal year, which ends June 30, 2020, our goal to fully fund our ministry plan for the final portion of the year is \$80,000. We are making a special ask to our members and friends to meet our contribution goal to fully fund our ministry plan/budget for

the third year in a row, if they are able. All contributions that are sent into the church, dropped off, given through give.dewittchurch.org, given through stock or IRA, or dated through June 30, 2020, will go towards achieving our goal.

Thank you for giving generously so we can close the 2019-2020 fiscal year strong. Your gifts continue to make a difference in our church and community.
