


From the Senior Minister



Just last month, I met with pastors and church staff in another state and asked them, "What's next for your church?" I was expecting to receive answers like, "we are going to bring back..." or "restart..." or "reopen our..."

What I heard back was, "We have been so disconnected, disjointed, and disrupted by the pandemic. We have to focus on examining and enriching what makes us, us." I was glad to hear they expressed what I have been feeling: our church, community, and our lives have been so dis- (fill-in-the-blank).

As we emerge from the pandemic, our equilibriums of life patterns have changed, and new ones are emerging? What are these patterns? We know some (virtual connection, online experiences, need for personal relationships, etc...) but don't know others (What will happen in 6 months?).

This time is an opportunity for us to start looking at what we do at DCC. This is an opportunity for us to enrich in the following areas of our spiritual life:

- **Life-Changing Intentional Gathering:** One-on-ones, small groups, and larger groups for connection, sharing life, and building friendships.
- **Life-Changing Spiritual formation**: How we grow in our spirit-filled life with God. We do this personally and together in study, prayer, reflection, worship, and learning.
- **Life-Changing Worship:** How we give God (not ourselves) praise, adoration, thanksgiving, hope, yearning, and love in our song, music, singing, word, and deed.
- **Life-Changing Service to Our Community:** How we use our hands and feet to be the transformation of Jesus Christ in our community and word.

In these weeks of summer, I hope you will join me in prayer and discernment in how God is leading us out of this pandemic. This fall, you will hear about some opportunities to join and how to lead some of these four life-changing areas of focus, and here's the kicker: things will be different. How? It will take our collective discernment to ask God how God is leading us into our new future. I ask that you will join with DeWitt Community Church in prayer and participation.

A Message from the Board President:

"Let's hold firmly to the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful; and let's consider how to encourage one another in love and good deeds, not abandoning our own meeting together, as is the habit of some people, but encouraging one another; and all the more as you see the day drawing near." - Hebrews 10:23-25

I finally decided to take the plunge and attend a live DCC service a few weeks ago. I have to admit I had gotten used to watching Alan and Cindy from the comfort of my couch over the last many months, but it was time for a change. I still marvel at how quickly and effectively DCC pivoted to online worship. Now that it is here, I truly hope it remains as I believe online worship is a great place to reach seekers who may be nervous attending worship in person, as well as established members who due to circumstance are unable to attend live worship. For those who have not yet resumed attending worship, let me share my impressions.

I found everything to be well-planned and logically set up. Church seating was clearly marked, separating families in a socially-distanced manner. Masks will be optional for those who are fully vaccinated, although that was not yet the case when I attended service. However, the temperature of the sanctuary was such that I did not feel inconvenienced by wearing a mask. Short of distancing and masks, the biggest change involved congregational music, which is a pro or a con, depending on how you look at it. It is a negative because people cannot hear my wife sing hymns. It is a pro because people do not have to hear me sing hymns. The quartet was beautiful – their recordings for online worship do not do justice to their talent. It was truly wonderful to hear. Seeing Alan and Cindy leading services from the pulpit felt delightfully normal, almost like it was 2019!

I must say that the best part of attending a live worship was looking around and seeing like-minded people worshipping together. I got to see several people I had not seen in quite some time, and it felt good. Not once did I feel uncomfortable with the way things were being run. I honestly felt much more comfortable worshipping at DCC than I do going to Wegmans or Home Depot at a busy time of day.

We all have our own comfort zones and I do not want anyone to think I am pressuring them to do something they are not ready to do. I do want to let people who think they are ready to take the next step in "re-entering society" to consider attending the next live DCC service. I do not think you will be disappointed.

I pray that our circumstances continue to improve and that I will see more of you worshipping with us at DCC in the near future.

Meals are provided to clients to go and clients no longer eat their meals at The Samaritan Center. DCC's next serve date is September 12, 2021. Please see the details below regarding volunteering:

- Two shifts are needed, and volunteers must commit to a 3 hour shift. The shifts are 9AM to Noon, and Noon to 3PM. 5 volunteers are needed for each shift. The 9AM to Noon shift is for meal preparation, and the Noon to 3PM shift is during meal serving time.
- Volunteers must be 18 years old or older
- Volunteers need to be able to stand for an entire 3 hour shift
- Volunteers need to be willing to wear a face mask at all times
- Volunteers do not have any COVID-19 symptoms or temperature, or have close contact with suspected or positive COVID-19 situation/ individual in the previous 14 days
- Volunteers are not on any quarantine or self-isolation directive









Road2RecoveryCNY

The nationwide opioid epidemic became very personal when our own son became addicted to heroin. He entered rehab several times, but relapsed each time within months of discharge. We felt helpless as he spiraled downward, losing hope, and dreading the phone call that would confirm his death. When he finally asked for help with his addiction, we knew we had to do something differently. Sending him out of state, to a long-term 12 step program, saved his life. Our health insurance would not pay for his treatment, so we dug deep and paid for it ourselves. This experience changed his life, and ours. Now our son is sober, healthy, and happy.

We are so grateful for his recovery, that we want to pass on this hope and healing to others in the Central New York Community. We started by sponsoring one person, then another, and then another. But there are many more out there who do not have the resources to pay for effective, long-term treatment, and our own finances cannot support all those in need. So we created Road2RecoveryCNY to do just that, and share our story so that people can realize that there is hope for recovery from heroin addiction.

-\$459,000.00 Raised to date -65% of alumni still sober after treatment -\$20,325.00 Cost to send one person to treatment -23 lives changed with treatment

We may not be able to change the world, but we can do more, right here, right now in CNY. With YOUR HELP we can save lives, one at a time.
